Multilingual Poster "Solidarity"

Typography Project

Goal:

To practice typographic layout featuring multiple languages. An exploration of diverse letterforms.

Materials:

- · Sketch book
- · Adobe Creative Suite
- · High quality paper for printing
- · White artboard
- · Rubber cement or spray adhesive

Readings:

- · The Meaning of the Tricontinental
- OSPAAAL Archiv Docs Populi
- · Revolucion!: Cuban Poster Art by Lincoln Cushing
- "Black Lives Matter" has become a global rallying cry against racism and police brutality

Process:

- Review the <u>digital collection of OSPAAL prints</u> (can include class discussion on points of inspiration).
- Individual journaling on the prompt "what does international solidarity mean to me?"
- Sketch a a poster concept that will feature the word "Solidarity" in 4 different languages with at least two of those languages being in a non-Roman script such as Arabic, Mandarin, Khmer, Tamil, etc.
- Move to the computer and utilize Adobe Fonts, <u>Google Noto</u>, or any other font provider that has the proper language support (*NOTE:* for projects with a short timeline, instructors might provide the word "Solidarity" already translated in 4 different languages in a Word Doc. For projects with a longer time-line, ask students to seek out help on their own to acquire the correct translations.)
- Conduct as many in-class critiques that time permits. With a longer timeline
 require students to have their work reviewed multiple times by different native
 speakers of the languages that are featured on their poster.

Final submission

- Print your final composition on high quality paper and trim to 11x17 inches (or whatever custom dimensions specified)
- Optional finishing: Mount on artboard with a 2 inch border
- Artist statement: write 1 paragraph describing your piece and what came up for you during the process of the project. Include your full name and date.

Note to instructors:

Depending on the experience of your students, and the amount of time available, you can scale the scope of work up or down. A simpler approach to this assignment can still include the readings about OSPAAAL and the journaling activity, while focusing simply on the form of the letters and words.
